For teachers:

"What do I look like? Who am I? Body, Identity and Expression" is teaching material for Nursery classrooms. It aims to cover certain very important knowledge which had been denied or ignored until now.

In classrooms, there are not only two perfectly defined groups, i.e., boys in blue and girls in pink, both limited to very specific anatomies, where there's no room for them to freely express themselves. Here we depict a broad, varied, undeniable and enriching reality, called diversity.


This teaching material, expressed using words and concepts that young children can easily understand, is designed to:

- Convey knowledge of other realities.
- •Work on self-perception.
- •Give students the chance to freely express their feelings.
- •Encourage respect towards other people, regardless of their characteristics or qualities.

What do I look like? Who am I?







The body is the physical and material structure of human beings, that is, our bones, arms, legs, ears, the colour of our skin, our teeth, our genitals. Our hair, its texture and colour, our hands and the shape of our fingers. Our height, and the amount of fat and muscle mass we have. The blood type that runs through our veins, the colour of our eyes, etc.

2. IDENTITY

Identity is the circumstance of every person which makes us feel one way or another. Our <u>brain</u> determines our identity and tells us who we are.

3. EXPRESSION

Expression (or gender expression) is the way we manifest our identity and way of being, including the way we dress, talk, play or move.

Some people are blonde or brunette, and others are redheads. Some have green eyes and curly hair, while others have green eyes and straight hair.

Some are left-handed, others are right-handed, and some others can even write with both hands.

People can be tall, short, thin or large. We might have big ears or have freckles and moles on our skin.


We might have deeper or higher voices. Also, our teeth and our skin can be many different shades.

People can feel many different things.


And though we are little, we are also sure of our identity!!!

You may identify as:


- ·A girl

Also, some girls don't like wearing skirts or headbands.






Some girls enjoy dressing up as princesses, and others like painting their nails.
